

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING

Communicable Disease Spotlight: Hepatitis C

Galion City Health Department nurses tested 47 adults for Hepatitis C free of charge in 2014, with kits provided by Ohio Department of Health. The adults were age 18 and older and all residents of Crawford County, with return antibody results of 25 adults that were positive, 19 adults were negative for antibodies, and 3 adults had indeterminate results or antibody levels not high enough to trigger a positive result.


The community and nation has seen a rise in new cases of Hepatitis C in adults and children. The main causative factor is the increase of intravenous drug usage and sharing of drug paraphernalia. The Ohio Department of Health had to discontinued the free testing program this year when funding was eliminated by Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.



School Nurse

The Health Department provides Registered Nurses to Galion City Schools for 30 hours per week, and to Crestline Exempted Village Schools for 20 hours per week. Both nurses provide vital links to medical care

2014 TOP 6 CONFIRMED COMMUNICABLE DISEASES



Galion City Health Department provided 35 low cost convertible rear-/forward-facing car seats to eligible families in 2014. Our certified car seat safety technician provides education, demonstrates proper use of the seat, and assists families in installing seats in their vehicles.

Food Safety

Galion City Health Department issued 113 licenses in the food program in 2014. Most are permanent food service (restaurants) and retail facilities, but there are 20 mobile units and 13 vending machine locations, too.

Plans were reviewed for 2 new facilities and 1 that changed ownership. Education about food safety is provided during each on-site inspection.



Rabies Prevention


Thirty-six (36) animal bites were reported in Galion in 2014: 23 dogs, 11 cats, 1 bat, and 1 fox. Following a bite, staff works with animal owners to ensure their pets are properly vaccinated against rabies to prevent the disease in animals and people.

The vast majority of the public health nuisances reported to the Health Department every year are related to solid waste, or trash on properties. Nearly 85% of nuisances in 2014 were due to trash. Other concerns included: food (4%), sewage (4%), scrap tires (3%), general environmental health (2%), school (1%), and water (1%).



THE PUBLIC HEALTH SYSTEM AND THE 10 ESSENTIAL PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICES

What Do Public Health Officials Do?

- Monitor the health status of a community to identify potential problems
- Diagnose and investigate health problems and hazards in the community
- Inform, educate, and empower people about health issues, particularly the underserved and those at risk
- Mobilize community partnerships to identify and solve health problems
- Develop policies and plans that support individual and community health efforts
- Enforce laws and regulations that protect health and ensure safety
- Ensure a competent public health workforce
- Evaluate effectiveness, accessibility, and quality of population based health services
- Research new insights and innovative solutions to health

The Public Health System


Public health systems are commonly defined as “all public, private, and voluntary entities that contribute to the delivery of essential public health services within a jurisdiction.” This concept ensures that all entities’ contributions to the health and well-being of the community or state are recognized in assessing the provision of public health services.

The public health system includes:

- Public health agencies at state and local levels
- Healthcare providers
- Public safety agencies
- Human service and charity organizations
- Education and youth development organizations
- Recreation and arts-related organizations
- Economic and philanthropic organizations
- Environmental agencies and organizations



10 ESSENTIAL PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICES



The 10 Essential Public Health Services describe the public health activities that all communities should undertake and serve as the framework for the NPHPS instruments. Public health systems should

1. Monitor health status to identify and solve community health problems.
2. Diagnose and investigate health problems and health hazards in the community.
3. Inform, educate, and empower people about health issues.
4. Mobilize community partnerships and action to identify and solve health problems.
5. Develop policies and plans that support individual and community health efforts.
6. Enforce laws and regulations that protect health and ensure safety.
7. Link people to needed personal health services and assure the provision of health care when otherwise unavailable.
8. Assure competent public and personal health care workforce.
9. Evaluate effectiveness, accessibility, and quality of personal and population-based health services.
10. Research for new insights and innovative solutions to health problems.
